

### A photograph is worth a thousand words ....

Photographs give us a glimpse into a past that is hard to recreate through words alone. As well as recording major events, they convey a wealth of social history through portraits of people, their houses and occupations. Photographs help us see what has changed but also what has remained constant over the years. Look at the picture of Dyers Hill taken in the 1890s and compare it with the one taken recently. The buildings and road layout are essentially the same and still recognisable yet there are also startling differences.

The museum is keen to make its large and fascinating archive of pictures more accessible, and eventually make them available online. So two of us have taken on the job of digitising the collection. While still preserving the physical photographs, we are working to get as much of the archive scanned, catalogued and keyworded as we can, making it easier to search through and find pictures.

A large number of photos had been scanned over recent years and these formed the basis of the first phase of the project. Keywording has taken us longer than we anticipated – it is painstaking work as there are dates and spellings to check, locations to identify and people to be named. We have also had to take into account how the names of houses and

even streets change over the years. (Market Street was once known as Observatory Street when a glass lantern was added to the Corner House roof.)

With roughly 5,000 photos already entered in the database, we are now moving on to sorting and scanning the many photos that have been kindly donated in recent years.

John Harrison is helping us with this task for which we are extremely grateful – thank you John.

Our oldest photos of Charlbury date from the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. Early photography was a job for professionals and the wealthy. We have some taken by Oxford-based photographer Henry Taunt (1842-1922), and by Frank Packer and Percy Sims who were professional photographers based in Chipping Norton. Photographers were commissioned to record special occasions like weddings or family gatherings such as that of the Horniblow family shown here.

Some make you smile, like the blacksmith at work with a small child and a dog perched on the back of a very well-behaved horse (a personal favourite). Others are very poignant – many of those who enlisted during the First World War had their portraits taken before heading to the front, some of them never to return.

Annual shows and fetes were a popular source of entertainment in the town in

the early 1900s. We have many photos of the annual flower shows and fetes run by organisations such as the fire brigade. These often took place in the grounds of Rangers Lodge and Lee Place.

They were very popular events and everyone wore their best clothes – unless they went in fancy dress. The people of Charlbury seem to have always loved dressing up and some of the outfits and floats must have taken months to put together.

It was only with the coming of roll film that cameras became mass produced and affordable. Cameras became much more common after the Second World War and this is reflected in the number of photos taken from the 1950s onwards. Today people take snaps all the time with their mobile phones though few get printed out. So if you have recent photos which you think would be of interest for the archive please do get in touch with the museum.

After September's meeting being largely devoted to the formalities of our AGM, October saw the first of our tasting sessions and on this occasion the presentation was given by members Andrew and Kozue. With Andrew's known passion for red wine, it was of little surprise to anyone that red was the dominant colour for the evening, with a modest concession for those wanting something with a little less colour - in the form of two very enjoyable rosés. At the end of the evening, the consensus was that never before had a member's presentation featured such a wide variety of prices – with a range of £40 from the lowest priced to the highest and the wines coming from Aldi, Majestic and Virgin Wines. Of the five reds tasted, there were various favourites, of course, with an Argentinian Cabernet Sauvignon from Aldi suiting some and others preferring the same variety from Chile via Virgin Wines. However, the star of the show was surely another offering from Virgin in the shape of an awardwinning Nauna Primitivo from Puglia, with tastes of dried fruit and smokiness on the nose - and packing a mighty 16%. Thank you Andrew and Kozue for an enjoyable introduction to some very interesting wines.

In November there will be a professional tasting, presented by Preet Sahota from Edgmond Wines in Newport, Salop and the following month will be our Christmas dinner when we will again be using the services of Tilia Catering from Stonesfield.

2025 will start with a member presenting their choices and then we will have return visits from local professionals Goedhuis Waddesdon, Eynsham Cellars and Haynes, Hanson & Clark.

Our tastings are held in the Memorial Hall, usually on the third Monday of the month. Guests and new members are

### News from the Charlbury Deli & Café Community owned and run since 1991

As you may have heard, it's been 'all change' at the Deli & Café this year.

First of all, Sir Stephen Bubb stood down as Chair and as a Director in July after over 3 years at the helm. And then a seismic shift occurred with our long serving Manager, Lynne Stubbles, retiring after 30 years in post, hotly followed by her Assistant, Nick Hoyle who is moving on to a new career after 6 years at the D & C. We can only wish all of them well in their various endeavours.

As you can imagine, this left us with large boots to fill so of the 3 remaining directors, I offered to take over as Chair and Hugo Pickering, who himself has been a director for 3 years, has taken over as Manager for the time being.

He will be reviewing the operation with a view to recruiting a permanent new Manager in the New Year. All this means we can't and aren't sitting on our laurels. At the time of going to press we are looking to recruit a couple of new directors (who are all volunteers) as well as reviewing the business and setting up a 'user group'.

By the time you read this we expect to have held an inaugural meeting for the group – look out for the next one if you missed it but would still like to give us your feedback and are interested in helping to see us through the next 30 years!

Equally, none of this means we are ignoring the fact that Christmas will be rapidly upon us - as if...! So as well as all our usual fare, there will be a selection of goodies, wines, spirits and presents all designed to help your Christmas be as merry as possible. And we'll be hosting some late opening evenings and no doubt some wine tasting, including I hope some Port with a personal connection - have a look in the window!



### **Cotswold Line Promotion Group**

CLPG have recently participated in some significant meetings with Great Western Railway, Firstly, our Chair, Colin Major accompanied the senior management of GWR and other interested bodies to the Palace of Westminster, to a meeting with all of the MPs representing constituencies served by the North Cotswold Line. The case was put for further re-doubling of the line and improvements to the service with the aim of operating a 'two trains an hour' service. That might seem like 'pie in the sky' but just consider that sixty years ago, just as Beeching was arriving on the scene, Charlbury had a train approximately every two hours, with only one in the morning running through to Paddington.

The journey time was more than two hours and there were no trains at all on Sundays. It has been a long struggle getting from one through train a day to the present hourly service but CLPG will keep working with GWR to improve things although, of course, we must wait to see the effect of the recent budget. All of the line's MPs agreed to support the proposals through Parliament.

Following on from that meeting, six management figures from GWR and Network Rail came out to Moreton in Marsh to a meeting with the CLPG Committee to discuss things of mutual interest and to listen to our concerns and suggestions. It is gratifying that both rail organisations value the presence and efforts of CLPG, and the cooperation between us. Oh that be the case with the Department for Transport also!

For the first time in a good many years, September saw CLPG take a stall at Street Fair. Our aim was to raise membership numbers, raise some funds and, of course, raise the Group's profile – the latter was achieved by our displaying posters publicising the group's origins,

aims, achievements and activities. Membership leaflets and timetables were freely handed out and readily received, with past and current copies of the Newsletter being sold, as were the muchadmired 'From The Thames To The Wye' books of walks between stations on the Cotswold Line.

We also had a simple 'Treasure Hunt', where visitors to our stall were invited to donate £1 - or multiples thereof - and, for each pound given, choose a square from a map of the railway line from Didcot to Hereford., with the chance of winning entrance tickets to one of the visitor attractions to be found on, or adjacent to the Cotswold Line. With prizes donated by Didcot Railway Centre, Oxford Visitor Guiding, Blenheim Palace, Oxford Bus Museum, Charlbury Museum, Cotswold Falconry Centre, Wellington Aviation Museum, Batsford Arboretum, Bourton on the Water Model Village, Severn Valley Railway and Hereford Cathedral 'Chained Library' there was surely something for everyone. CLPG thanks all of the above for unhesitatingly and generously supporting us by donating family tickets to their sites, enabling us to raise much needed funds.

It was a lot of hard work and to the questions 'was it worth it?' and 'will you do it again?', the answers must be 'yes' and 'yes'. We did gain some new members, we did raise some funds and we did raise the profile of CLPG, at the same time as helping the Street Fair Committee raise circa £6,000 to help maintain the Corner House and the Memorial Hall.

### Wellbeing is key to the Community Workshop

It's been nearly a year now since Charlbury's Community Workshop opened its front door for 'business', so here's a quick look at what's been happening. One of our big success stories has been the number of people who have come in with a wide variety of things that need fixing: thus far, we've turned our hands to garden furniture, to ornaments, to kitchen scales and pans, to tool handles; the list goes on. We've even repaired a rucksack and a prom dress (not for the same person, though!). There have been special softcraft sessions. And, of course, we've held two very successful sharpening days, where we've restored garden tools, kitchen knives and scissors to a usable condition.

Positive as all of that is, it's not actually what we had in mind when we first aired the idea for the Workshop a number of years ago. The concept came originally from Australia, where it was realised that a really good way of reducing social isolation is to provide a place where people can connect, enjoy conversation and be creative. People need people, and the Workshop's aim is to give anyone and everyone a place where they

can find help to improve their wellbeing by reducing loneliness.

Our problem now is reaching out to more of the people within Charlbury and the surrounding communities who could benefit from what the Workshop has to offer. ### **News from Charlbury Library**

Christmas is around the corner but it feels like we've only just finished the Summer Reading Challenge! We had lots of local children signing up for the challenge, reading books over the summer holidays and collecting their stickers and rewards. We also had two Summer Reading Challenge-themed Stories & Craft sessions over the summer holidays and an Autumn/ Halloween one in the October half-term. We hold these free events during most school holidays so look out for the next one which should be in February half-term.

Starting in December, there will be a Winter Mini Challenge organised by the Reading Agency, that runs through to February and is free to join. It encourages children to keep reading during those colder, darker months and they can collect rewards for logging and reviewing books. They can also unlock special badges and earn a certificate of achievement once they have reached their reading goal! This is an online only challenge, with more information at wintermini.org.uk

We've got our Christmas/Winter range of children's books out on display now, some from last year's collection and plenty of new ones too.

### News from the Charlbury Patient Participation Group.

Recently CMC has successfully appointed **two additional GPs** who are keen to work in a small family practice such as ours. Dr Jakeman is already working for a few sessions before commencing employment in early November. Patients who were registered with Dr Hurney will for the most part move to Dr Jakeman's patient list. Dr Harumi's sessions will be on Tuesday and Friday starting from 11 October.

It is hoped that when fully staffed this will result in a significant increase in available appointments.

**Positive and negative comments.** We have recently discussed the best and most effective way for patients to comment on services received at CMC, or if necessary make a formal complaint.

"The NHS Friends and Family Test (FFT) is a way of gathering your feedback, so we can continually review our service. Your feedback will help us learn more about what you think of your experience - what you like and what you think we could improve. Ultimately, you're helping us to make changes that will ensure we can offer the best possible care. {Forms for the Friends and Family test are on the desk by reception}. "We make every effort to give the best service possible to our patients. However, we are aware that things can go wrong resulting in a patient feeling that they have a genuine cause for complaint. If this is so, we would wish for the matter to be settled as quickly, and as amicably, as possible. To pursue a complaint please contact the practice manager who will deal with concerns appropriately."

Comments, both good and bad, and complaints can be made using the

feedback form, by telephoning and asking to speak to Kathy Gale, or in writing. All complaints of a serious nature are escalated to NHS England.

If the issue is regarding prescriptions, please ring dispensary directly and they will be able to help. Leave a message if the call is unanswered. Messages are checked frequently during the day. If regarding appointments please discuss with reception but after 10:30 am.

The practice is always pleased to receive positive feedback, letters and cards of thanks. It is important that they know when services are working well so they can build on good practice.

**Vaccination clinics.** Three covid and flu vaccination clinics in October were well attended and ran very smoothly. Thank you to Charlbury for helping elderly and disabled patients park near to the Sports Centre. And to the community centre for agreeing to their parking area being reserved for clinic attendees.

Do you sometimes find your call from the CMC (a No ID number) is immediately cut off? It is time consuming to have to phone to reinstate it, and annoying for the clinician to lose the slot for your consultation. You can alter your settings to accept a call from a 'No ID' number, but it is better to tell Reception that this might happen and they can ensure from their end that the call gets through.

Finally all GP Practices are concerned about the considerable additional cost of the employer NI contributions recently announced in the Budget, and the implications this has for running the Practice and recruiting new staff. You will have heard about this on the News and hopefully ,by the time you are reading this, the issue will have resolved.

### **Churches Together in Charlbury**

In July we elected a new government. The new Prime Minister has announced five missions which he modestly hopes will change the country for the better. Two thousand years ago, one of the first Christian missionaries, St Paul, travelled through the Roman empire preaching the new faith. When he reached Thessalonica in mainland Greece, he and the small group of Christians there were accused of turning the world upside down – a bit more than Sir Kier Starmer is expecting.

At the time of writing this the UN conference on biodiversity is taking place in Colombia. If anything needs turning upside down it is our attitude towards the natural world that nourishes and sustains us.

The extinction of species, the takeover of land for intensive farming, the plunder of fish stocks and damage to the sea bed, the clear felling of forests should alarm us and provoke us to change our habits rapidly. The UN conference on climate change taking place in Azerbaijan in November should reinforce the urgency of our situation.

It takes courage to change, belief that change is possible and hope that together we can make a difference. This is something that members of churches and other faith groups know well although we haven't always lived as if we believed it. When governments and commercial enterprises see that people are determined to change, their attitudes change. We may not feel we are turning the world upside down but many small

changes to the way we live, the food we eat, the clothes we wear, the way we spend money, can make a profound difference to the protection of our environment and future developments.

Charlbury is full of people trying to make a positive change to the world around us. Think of the CRAG committee raising money for services to refugees and asylum seekers. Think of Cotswold Wardens maintaining and protecting the rural environment. Think of all the volunteers involved in the sports clubs, the Beer Festival, the library, the Arts Festival, the Street Fair, Cornerstone and many other activities which enrich our lives and support charitable causes.

One of the things we can do this Advent is help make a collection of useful things for The Porch in Oxford. The Porch provides a day centre with meals, showers, a clothing store, access to computers and above all company and support for people without secure housing or no home at all. Information about what is needed and where to bring donations can be found in the churches, on the Charlbury website and at Cornerstone, Everything from a few biscuits or stock cubes to a box full of supplies will be useful for helping The Porch continue to offer a welcome to people who need a place to rest and be cared for over Christmas and into the New Year.

This year, the Cotswold Voluntary Wardens have been making improvements to the footpaths through Wigwell. In the spring, we rebuilt the permissive path through the swamp below the burial ground, and during the summer we were kept busy for several work-party sessions installing the flight of steps up the steep slope beyond the brook.

If you haven't already tried them out, they have made getting up the bank there much easier.

The materials for the permissive path were paid for by the Evenlode Catchment Project, while funding for the Wigwell steps came from two sources: from local councillor Liz Leffman, who gave a generous sum from her discretionary allowance, and the rest from the Oxfordshire Trust for the Environment [TOE]. Thanks to both for helping us to keep our Public Rights of Way useable year-round, working in close cooperation with OCC.

And there's more to be done! As well as maintaining the Rights of Way and permissive footpaths around Charlbury, our area covers South Warwickshire as far as the M40, and during the autumn, we carried out a major reconstruction project on another flight of steps up to the windmill near Tysoe.

The last time we worked on those steps was about 20 years ago, but time and weather have taken their toll of the timber.

Aside from that, we have spent a lot of time and energy clearing footpaths of vegetation that has loved the constant rain. This can't be said by those wardens who lead guided walks, though! Underfoot conditions can become tricky – so all the more reason for the Wardens to try to sort out the slippery bits.

The Wardens' walks programme for the winter months is never as full as those during the summer, but please keep checking www.cotswolds-nl.org.uk and follow the guided walks link. There will be pre-Christmas walks, a snowdrop walk, a walk from the Cotswold Distillery and more – with dates still to be confirmed.

Some of you may have noticed copies of the *Cotswold Lion* in the Community Centre. Full of interesting articles, the *Lion* no longer carries a list of future guided walks, so check the website. The *Lion* is free, so please pick one up if you spot one.

#### **Solar Panels**

The Town Council's Buildings Team is facilitating a project for residents to explore the benefits of installing solar panels on their properties and also investigating if multi-installation discount can be obtained. We have received six enquiries so far and are awaiting comparative prices from potential installers for five properties. Please note, the Town Council is not funding or managing this project but just acting as an intermediary.

Following the success of second Speed Indicator Device (SID), purchased last year and the support of our Community Speedwatch team in moving it around town, the Town Council has agreed to buy a third SID. There are increasing calls from residents to have the SID placed on their roads because it does make a difference to speeds and thus to pedestrian safety.

The permissive path between Hundley Way and Banbury Hill Farm (and the Old Shed) will also be closed on Wednesday 8th January 2025.

I write this following the Chancellor's budget statement on October 31<sup>st</sup>. What will this mean for us in Oxfordshire? It isn't entirely clear at the moment and we will not know for certain what the effect will be on council services until December, but there was some good news.

The extra £500 million for potholes is welcome (though it won't go very far, unfortunately, as we need an extra £45 million a year to properly manage our roads in Oxfordshire alone), and the news that the government is investing in East West Rail is also very encouraging. But we have no news on what might be available to support our North Cotswold Line and I am still lobbying, along with councillors from along the line, to get the investment that we need to make this a frequent and reliable service.

An event was held by the North Cotswold Line Task Force on September 4<sup>th</sup> to show the business case to our new MPs. The MPs along the line are setting up an all-party group to lobby for improvements to the line in support of NCLTF

I am also pleased that the cap on bus fares will continue, though it's a pity that it will go up to £3 from the current £2. The capped fare is available on both the S3 and the X9 bus, and the new X9

Sunday service is being well used by local people and I hope will continue to be.

Here in Charlbury we have a very active Community Action Group (CAG) in the Charlbury Green Hub, and I am particularly pleased that OCC and the 112 CAGs across the county won a national award in the partnership category at the 2024 Local Authority Recycling Advisory Committee awards in October.

Our partnership has been going strong for over 20 years, and in 2023/24 diverted around 2,000 tonnes of material from being thrown away in landfill. Charlbury Green Hub is one of the most established and active of the CAGs.

As many will be aware, there has recently been a consultation on parking in the town. The consultation closed on November 22nd. We are very fortunate to have the station as well as shops and businesses in our town, but this does pose issues around parking. I would like to thank the many people who have contributed their thoughts and ideas to the consultation.

I wish everyone in Charlbury a very happy Christmas and a healthy and prosperous New Year.

#### Charlbury's Year of Nature Recovery Launch Party. Saturday I Ith January 2-5pm in Charlbury Memorial Hall

2025 is Charlbury's Year of Nature Recovery, which is going to be launched with a (tea) party on 11<sup>th</sup> January. #### **Charlbury Refugee Action Group**

For those of you new to Charlbury, or to 'The Chronicle', first of all, welcome! And a brief introduction to CRAG. We are a registered charity that raises funds in and around Charlbury by organising events for the benefit of refugees. We also raise awareness about the difficulties faced by asylum seekers and refugees in this country and abroad.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of our supporters in Charlbury and beyond, we have so far raised over £160,000 and been able to help refugees facing appalling conditions and fleeing wars in many countries.

In September, we welcomed **Dr Lizzie Alarcon-Clark** who gave a very informative talk about her recent experience as a medical volunteer in Calais for **FAST** (First Aid Support Team), a small NGO providing essential medical care to displaced people. Due to the generosity of those who attended, £330 was donated directly to FAST.

Also, thanks to your kindness in September, we were able to send another sizeable collection of clothes, tents, bedding and hygiene items to **Care4Calais**, one of our partner charities.

## Priority Services Register (priority support for eligible electricity, gas and water customers)

The Priority Services Register (PSR) is a scheme to ensure that people on the Register receive priority support and information if they are ever without electricity, gas or water either in an emergency or because of planned work. The service also helps utility companies to look after customers who have extra communication, access or safety needs and to tailor their services to support households who need extra help with everyday energy matters like bills.

You're eligible for free PSR services if you meet any of the following criteria:

- Are of pensionable age
- Live with any children under 5
- Have a hearing or sight condition
- Have a disability or chronic illness
- Have a loss or impairment of smell
- Temporarily need extra support
- Have anxiety, depression or any mental health condition
- Need documents translated into another format or language
- Use medical equipment reliant on electricity or water

The PSR is completely free and confidential To register you can:

#### Local partnership to help older people and their carers stay safe and warm in their homes

AgeUK Oxfordshire (AUKO) has set up a new partnership with SGN, aimed at providing essential support to older people and their carers, to ensure that they can stay safe and warm in their homes. This partnership will focus on delivering vital information, entitlements and tools. SGN, a leading gas distribution company, will work closely with AUKO to offer practical assistance and resources.

- Carbon monoxide (CO) safety: Raising awareness of the dangers of CO and distributing free carbon monoxide detectors to the most vulnerable.


